From the Pastor

A few weekends ago, we shared a message about how God has entrusted us with two callings: first, to be keepers of the flame and, second, to be **passers of the torch**. The flame we keep is what the apostle Paul talks about in 2 Corinthians 4:6 where he says, "God said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' and He made His light shine in our hearts in order to give us the light of the knowledge of His glory displayed in the face of Jesus."

Here's the "passing the torch" part: Paul writes to his young pastor friend, Timothy, in 2 Timothy 2:1-2 and says, "You, my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus, that is, in this life with God. The things you heard me say, this Good News

about Jesus and the life, forgiveness and direction that He offers, entrust to reliable people who will also be qualified to teach it to others."

Obviously, I think we would all have to say that we are part of God's family because somebody passed a torch to us, somebody told us about Jesus. Our school's theme this year is "Making Disciples for Life." What a great theme! That is exactly what our Lord Jesus did. He picked out twelve friends to follow Him and said, "I'll give you a torch worth passing; I'll show you how to live with My Father. I'll die on a cross for you so you can have forgiveness, and I'll rise from the tomb for you so you can live in hope, and I'll ascend to the Father for you so the Holy Spirit that is in Me can be in you."

The greatest flame of truth in the history of the human race was passed to those twelve disciples and then beyond them and beyond and beyond until right now, to you and to me. It is the only flame that truly matters: knowing, believing and trusting in Jesus who is the Light of the World. Because that is true, it is the torch we want to continue to pass. Friends, this is too important for us to ever lose our passion and dedication to pursuing these two callings; we have the opportunity to continue making an eternal impact, and, God leading and blessing us, we will!

What an exciting time it is to be the Church and to be a part of the Saint Michael family! 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From the Board of Missions

"Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these."

Much work has been going on in the five churches and several home churches in the Dominican Republic this year. There are two sites in or near Santo Domingo, the capital. They are Bread of Life and Los Minos. The other sites are in or near Santiago. They are Friends of Life, Lamb of God in Licey and Pueblo Nuevo in Santiago.

Most of the activities are common to all locations such as Bible studies

for men, women and children, baptisms, confirmation classes and access to a Mercy Center. They all want more congregational participation and visitation to those who are no longer attending on a regular basis.

Los Minos does not have a building. So, they worship in a park. Friends of Christ has 100-200 people who worship weekly online. They also have piano, guitar and recorder lessons along with several sports. Unique to this church are Portuguese (spoken in Brazil) language lessons.

Lamb of God, which is in Licey, is an instance in which we were involved in construction of the church and school. This school also maintains a garden and grows food which is used for lunches. Once a month, there is an English language service. They have an outreach to Villa Dora, which is nearby, and the surrounding communities.

Pueblo Nuevo is in Santiago and is in the process of calling an assistant pastor. Their big emphasis is having the laity assume more of the leadership. Since this is in the city, they face social problems different to what the other churches face.

Lutheran Church of Palmar Arriba is the one with which we are most familiar. Pastor Idjon is one of the men who was ordained a few years ago. He, along with seminarians and deaconesses, holds daily devotions for the school children. Since the seminary is in the same building as the school, the seminarians are heavily involved in the school and in the community. This location also has several sports, and they would like to construct a multipurpose field. There are two worship services: one on Sunday and another during the week. As the group home is located next to the school, the now young adults get the benefits of having the seminarians as part of their daily life.

The New Lutheran Hymnal which has been in the works for ten years was recently published. This is a real blessing for the community. Also, four new pastors were ordained as were 70 deaconesses from the Latin and Caribbean area. These women learned online and are now participating in the care of the people in their respective countries.

We have also continued growing our relationship with the police and firefighters. The new regional police chief has requested training for his unit. So, police from LCSO will do that in Santiago. We have donated bulletproof vests for a unit in Montecristi. A new group of police is coming in July for training by LCSO. English classes for police and firefighters continue with a new teacher. A principal from a very poor area has requested scholarships for ten students.

Thank you to Pastor Jon, to the board and to all of you who have kept the mission in your prayers.

On a final note, after sixteen years, I am stepping down from the board. I have enjoyed my time serving, and it's now time for someone else to take over. Thank you for your cooperation as we all do God's work.
