From the Pastor

It's November which means that one important day comes to mind. On the fourth Thursday of November, we celebrate Thanksgiving. But why? Long before European settlers came to the East Coast of what is now the United States, the area was inhabited by many Native American tribes. The area surrounding the site of the first Thanksgiving, present day southeastern Massachusetts and eastern Rhode Island, had been the home of the Wampanoag people and had been visited by other European settlers before the arrival of the *Mayflower* in 1620. The people who comprised the Plymouth Colony were a group of English Protestants called Puritans who wanted to break away from the Church of England.

They did so, sailing across the Atlantic Ocean in 1620 to settle in a "New World." Carrying 101 men, women and children, the *Mayflower* traveled the ocean for 66 days and was supposed to land where New York City is now located. But windy conditions forced the group to cut their trip short and settle at what is now Cape Cod, Massachusetts.

As the Puritans prepared for winter, they gathered anything they could find, including Wampanoag supplies. The Wampanoag realized that these English settlers were preparing for a harvest celebration. Seeing that they were a peaceful people, the Wampanoag joined them in their celebration. For three days, the English and native men, women and children ate together. The meal consisted of deer, corn, shellfish and roasted meat. They played ball games, sang and danced. Although prayers and thanks were probably offered at the 1621 harvest gathering, the first recorded religious Thanksgiving Day in Plymouth happened two years later in 1623. On this occasion, the colonists gave thanks to God for rain after a two-month drought.

The concept of giving thanks goes much further back than the East Coast of North America in 1621. The Greek word for Thanksgiving, "Eucharisteo," is found in the New Testament particularly connected to another meal (namely Holy Communion). In its simplest terms, it means, "give thanks." A deeper study of the word reveals that it is made up of a combination of words. At the very root of "Eucharisteo" is the word "charis," meaning "grace" and its close derivative "chara," meaning "joy."

Indeed, our Lord Jesus Christ entered our creation and joined our humanity to give us forgiveness, life and salvation but also the deep sense of His joy which surrounds us always. Jesus tells us in John 15:11, "These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full."

Meaningful and lasting "chara" joy is found only in Jesus and at His table of "Eucharisteo," the table of thanksgiving. This is why Holy Communion is sometimes called the Eucharistic Meal. It is this Thanksgiving table that is at the center of our

reason for always giving thanks to God for it is here that we are reminded again and again that in Christ we are forgiven, redeemed and loved with an everlasting love. Soon enough, the turkey and the ham on our tables will be carved up, eaten, enjoyed and then forgotten about. But the table of Thanksgiving which the Lord prepares for us week after week is preparing us for an eternal celebration with Him in the new creation. Until that day comes, we live in the hope, the promise and the joy of Jesus, giving Him thanks for all He has done for us. From my family to yours, may you have a blessed and joy-filled Thanksgiving!
