From the Pastor

Happy New Year! With every new beginning, we make new promises and new plans for ourselves. But what happens when January turns into February? Research has shown that 92% of people fail at fulfilling their New Year's resolutions. "New year, new me" ends up becoming "new year, same me." Long before New Year's resolutions came along, the prophet Isaiah wrote this of the Lord's interaction in our life: "Behold, I am doing a new thing, do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19). The new things that Isaiah is writing

about are the fulfillment of God's deliverance for the Israelites after their Babylonian captivity. God has always been with His people, and He will never fail us (even when we fail ourselves). We know that God is perfect and that He never fails, but what about us? Why do we make resolutions for ourselves only to break them? Carey Nieuwhof, the founding pastor of Connexus Church in Ontario, Canada and the author of several books on church leadership and personal growth, gives the following reasons as to why people fail to keep their resolutions:



If your goals die on a piece of paper, it's because nothing happens beyond writing them down. The truth is that next year will be exactly like this year unless you change more than your intention.

Momentum That Creates False Success

Momentum masks underlying problems, creating a false sense of success. This means that when your momentum ends (as it inevitably will) you have a much bigger mess to clean up than if you had worked on a strategy that produces long-term growth in the first place.

Lack of Momentum That Creates a False Sense of Failure

In the same way momentum can create a false sense of success, the lack of momentum can prematurely create a sense of failure, that any attempt at a fresh goal is useless, and that's a lie.

Nieuwhof concludes with this thought: "The difference between goals that get realized and goals that don't is the presence or absence of a strategy."

With that thought in mind, I'm asking you to be in prayer for our congregational leadership as we continue to meet with Jacob Hoyer from Clarity Navigators. Together, we will be finalizing the vision frame for our congregation along with long- and short-range plans as the Lord leads us into the future. I invite you to be in prayer (especially on January 13, February 9-10, March 9 and April 13). Why? These are the

dates that Jacob will be personally meeting with our vision team as we pray, plan and prepare to present the results to you! A new year offers us many opportunities to set new resolutions not only for our personal lives but also for the life of the church. To that end, may the Lord continue to bless us, guide us and help us to not only set goals for our ministry but also to follow through with fulfilling them. I'm excited for the new things the Lord is doing at St. Michael. I pray you are too!

January is **National Blood Donation month**. St. Michael will be celebrating 15 years of having the Lee Health Blood Mobile coming to our campus!

The generous donation of one pint of blood can help save the lives of three people. Did you know that your blood donation is separated into different components? Your platelets may go to a child with leukemia, your plasma to a patient with a clotting problem and your red blood cells to an accident victim, a surgical patient or a cancer patient. The entire life-saving process takes approximately 45 minutes. The actual donation time is only 5-10 minutes. To donate blood, you must weigh at least 115 pounds, be at least 17 years old (or 16 with parental consent) and provide photo ID (if you're a new donor).



Did you know that every time you donate blood, you receive a mini-physical? This is comprised of a pulse rate check, a blood pressure check, a body temperature check, a hemoglobin level check and a blood type and cholesterol level upon successful donation check.



With caring hearts, please consider donating. All the blood donated to our blood centers stays right here in Southwest Florida. That means that together we can save lives, make an impact and help the people closest to us. It's community helping community!

I would like to give special thanks to Laurel Volberding for managing the schedule of the Lee Health Blood Mobile coming to our campus every other month and a special thank you to all who generously donate. There is no substitute for human blood; it is truly a gift of life!

Worship Packs for Kids



What Is Family Ministry?

- 2. **Family ministry is a partnership between the church and the home.** Some advocate that discipleship happens best at church or happens at home, but Scripture reveals how the two work together in collaboration. When the responsibility and effort to raise up the next generation is shared by the family and the church, a more holistic approach can be undertaken.
- 3. Family ministry focuses on three groups: kids, parents and leaders. The kids are the most obvious of the three groups. These are the ones staff and leaders often have the deepest heart for. After all, why would you start serving in kids ministry without a desire to invest in kids? Parents and leaders are also a necessary component of ministry to the next generation but are easy to forget. A faithful and effective family ministry will intentionally invest in the kids, their parents and their leaders.
- 4. **Family ministry aims to develop disciple-making disciples.** The aim is to grow kids, parents and leaders to become more like Jesus in such a way that they become more faithful disciples who are doing the same for others.
