## From the Pastor

As Americans, this month finds its focus on Independence Day which commemorates the adoption of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. This document declared the 13 American colonies independent from Great Britain, a new nation declaring its freedom and its independence.

While often used interchangeably, freedom and independence differ in scope. Freedom is the general ability to act as one pleases while independence is the state of not being subject to the control of others. As a Lutheran Christian, freedom and independence take on a spiritual meaning and understanding in light of Holy Scripture. The reformer, Martin Luther, had much to say on the topic of the freedom we have as Christians in a tract he wrote and published in 1520. On the Freedom of the Christian explains the evangelical theology of the Reformation. Having posted the 95 Theses in October of 1517, Luther was shortly thereafter threatened with being charged as a heretic by the Roman Catholic Church. Luther responded with a fury of written articles, each tract meant to persuade Rome that his teaching was grounded in Scripture. To the Christian Nobility of the German Nation was published on August 18, 1520. The Babylonian Captivity of the Church was published on October 6 and On the Freedom of the Christian was put out early in November of 1520. This third writing of Luther's is one of the most enduring treatments on Christian freedom.

He begins with two seemingly contradictory propositions:

"A Christian is an utterly free man, lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is an utterly dutiful man, servant of all, subject to all."

This paradoxical approach in teaching Christian freedom mirrors the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ and St. Paul by joining lord and servant together. By faith alone, God sets a man completely free in Christ. He is lord of all, subject to none. Yet, love binds him as a servant to his neighbor, subject to everyone. The paradox and tension of Christian freedom is found in faith and love together.

The lens through which Luther sees the Christian existence in the world is through Christ: His person and work lived out as He applies His saving effects to the Christian.

Luther summarizes this connection of Christ and the Christian's freedom in his tract via 1 Corinthans 9:19, "For though I am free from all men, I have made myself a slave to all," and in Romans 13:8, "Owe no one anything, except to love one another."

Love by its very nature is ready to serve and be subject to him who is loved. So Christ, although He was Lord of all, was "born of woman, born under the law" (Galatians 4:4), and therefore was at the same time a free man and servant, "in the form of God" and "of a servant" (Philippians 2:6-7).

As completely free as Jesus was (incarnationally speaking), He also bound Himself under the law to serve His creatures and win their eternal salvation. The salvation Jesus won for us has given us Christian freedom. This is what is written in John 8:36: "So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed." What a comfort this Gospel brings with it! By faith alone, the Christian receives all that Christ gives. Faith alone is the saving and efficacious use of the Word of God according to Romans 10:9. "If you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."

In accordance with the teaching of Scripture, a person is justified by faith alone and not any works;

for if they could be justified by anything else, they would not need the Word and consequently not need faith. This is the part that most people don't see in us as Christians: the Lord working in our heart and mind, fulfilling His good and gracious purpose in and through us.

But does that mean the liberty and freedom Luther writes about is a liberty of ease? Is the Christian free to avoid contributing to society? It does not. As long as we live in this body, we begin to show progress outwardly as to what the Christian life looks like. Luther continues:

"Here the works begin: we must indeed take care to discipline our body by fastings, watchings, labors, and other reasonable discipline and subject it to the Spirit so that it will obey and conform to the inner man and faith and not revolt against faith and hinder the inner man, as it is the nature of the body to do if not held in check." Lest we think this makes for a boring life, it doesn't. As we continue gaining an understanding that we have faith as a gift given to us, we are created in the image of God and we have been saved for all eternity, we serve God joyfully and without thought of gain in love that is not constrained.

Ultimately, On the Freedom of the Christian is a confession of Christ in a nutshell. Christian freedom is a gift from Christ Himself, "For freedom Christ has set us free..." (Galatians 5:1). What Christ did to win salvation in His divine and human natures, He imputes to those who by Baptism bear His name: Christian. God justifies the sinner by faith alone. The sinner is changed over the course of their life after the likeness of Christ. The Christian is at once utterly free in faith and a servant to all in works of love. As an American, may you live and enjoy the freedom the Declaration of Independence grants to you. As a Christian, may you live daily in your Baptism and in the freedom that Christ has won for you here in time and for eternity. Independence Day blessings to you!
